"The Broad Street Market is an oasis in the midst of a food desert. We have been connecting our urban Harrisburg community with agriculture for more than 150 years," said Amy Hill, Broad Street Market Alliance chairperson. "Providing access to fresh, nutritious Pennsylvania produce is an important part of our mission."

In the <u>Pennsylvania Farm Bill</u> signed earlier this year by Governor Tom Wolf, PA Preferred received an increase in funding by \$1 million to provide improved benefits to its farmer members and improve consumer awareness around the statewide branding program and fuel the buy local movement in Pennsylvania.

"We should always be thankful for Pennsylvania's farm families, but Thanksgiving serves as the perfect reminder of their hard work," added Redding. "As you enjoy a wholesome and nutritious Thanksgiving feast next week, I encourage you to pause in recognition of those whose livelihoods make the holiday bounty possible for us all to enjoy."
